Looking back at 2023: key highlights

2023 saw a gradual shaping of a new 'normal' post-Covid in education, but also a realisation that the pandemic has changed educational experiences and outcomes in ways we are only beginning to be able to understand. Early indications suggest that the pandemic has affected children, young people and adults profoundly and in ways that will matter for individuals and society well into the foreseeable future. Much of our research and public engagement aims to inform policy and practice in these areas, for example, through the following major cross-national and international projects:

[Excluded Lives: Political Economies of School Exclusion in the UK](#) (2019-2024). [Gilleen McCluskey](#) and [Annie Taylor](#) continued, with colleagues from the University of Oxford, Cardiff University, London School of Economics and Queen's University Belfast, to work on this cross-national, interdisciplinary ESRC-funded project. This study seeks to advance a multi-disciplinary understanding, and home-international comparison, of the political economies of exclusion, and how more equitable outcomes can be achieved for pupils, their families, and professionals across the four countries of the UK.



Looking back at 2023:

[TEAMS \(Teaching that Matters for Migrant Students\)](#) (2020-2024). [Nataša Pantić](#), in collaboration with researchers from the Universities of Stockholm, Jyväskylä and Turku, continued to explore the ways in which teachers, schools and education systems respond to migrant students. The project investigates the educational practices and structural conditions that facilitate academic success, cross-cultural socialization and the development of a sense of belonging. The work is funded by the Joint Nordic-UK Research Programme on Migration and Integration, including the Academy of Finland, the Swedish Research Council, Forte of Sweden, the Research Council of Norway, RANNÍS of Iceland, and the Economic and Social Research Council, part of UK Research and Innovation and NordForsk.

As part of its commitment to ensuring research engages with and informs wider public concerns in education, CREID members also contributed to the [Scottish Public Inquiry on COVID-19](#). [Ian Fyfe](#), [Gillian McCluskey](#), [Rosa Murray](#), [Zoë Robertson](#) and [Annie Taylor](#) were commissioned by Scotland's Public Inquiry on Covid-19 to provide an oversight study on, a) the impact of Covid-19 on the delivery of education and certification for all learners at all stages of education in Scotland, and b) the impacts on identified groups of children and young people known to face particular disadvantage within education.
